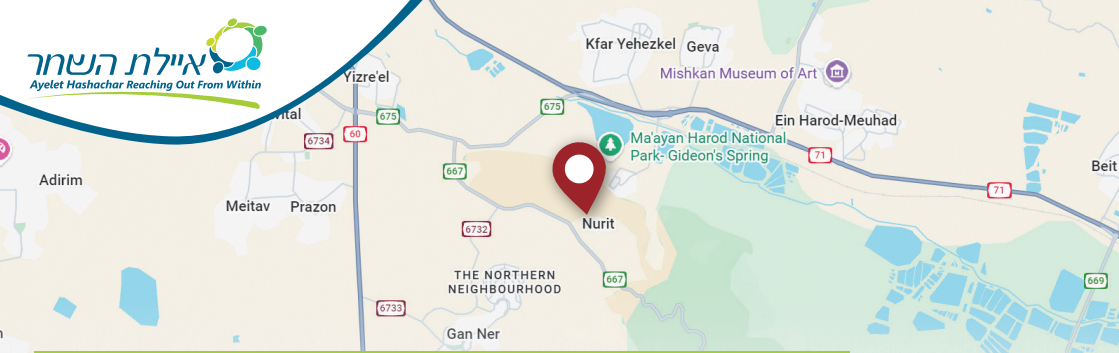

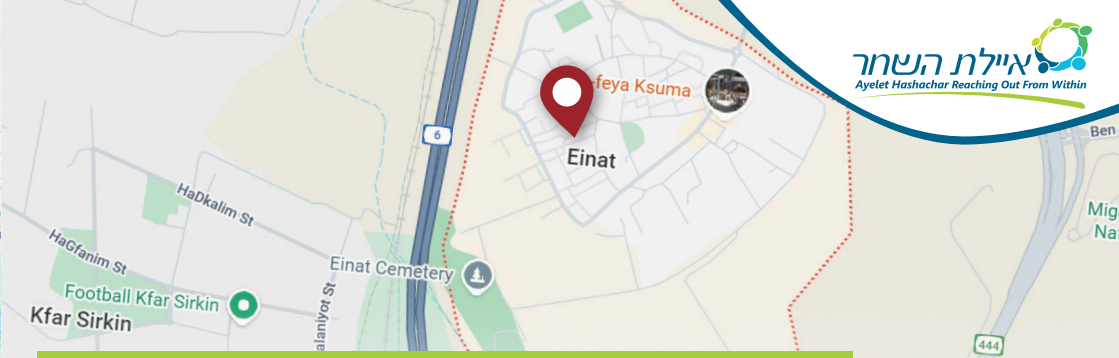


Construction of the first synagogue

Expected completion 08/2026





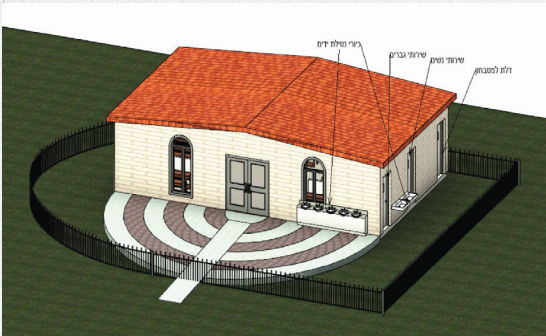
Construction of the synagogue

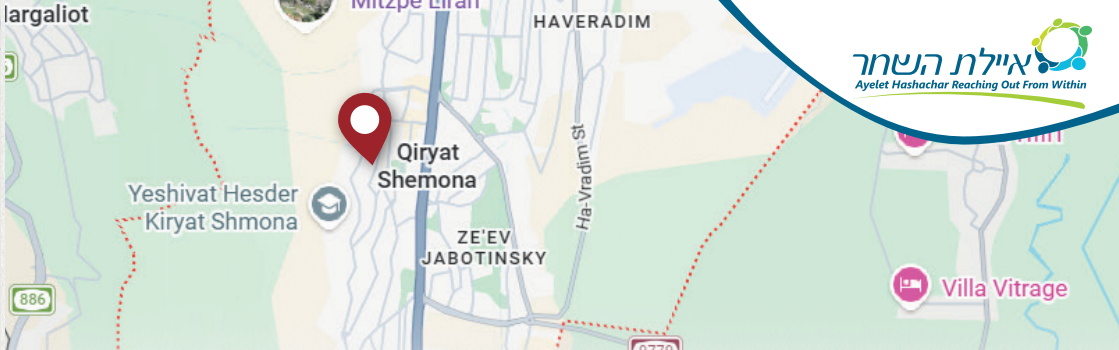


Construction of the first synagogue

A "Miniature Sanctuary" Awaits You on the Frontline.

In Kiryat Shmona

During the recent months of combat (2024-2026), the city of Kiryat Shmona has stood at the forefront of the campaign. Many buildings in the city suffered severe damage, including our most sacred sites—our synagogues - which have always been the beating heart of prayer, community, and resilience.

Central synagogues in the city were damaged by a combination of blast waves, missile shrapnel, and the forced neglect resulting from the prolonged evacuation of residents:

The Rashbi Synagogue (HaNasi St.): Sustained heavy blast damage from nearby "Burkan" rocket impacts, which shattered windows and caused cracks in the building's infrastructure.

The Yeshurun Synagogue (Herzl St.): Suffered shrapnel penetration that damaged interior furniture and utilities, and the building's exterior shell.

In order for us to bring the sound of prayer back to the streets of Kiryat Shmona—so that residents returning home find a worthy and welcoming sanctuary—we need you.

Your contribution will be used for:

Repairing blast damage, windows, and exterior cladding.

Restoring the interiors, ceilings, and equipment damaged by shrapnel.

Preparing the synagogues for the return of the congregations and restoring religious services to the city.

Join us as together we will rebuild the sanctuaries of Kiryat Shmona.

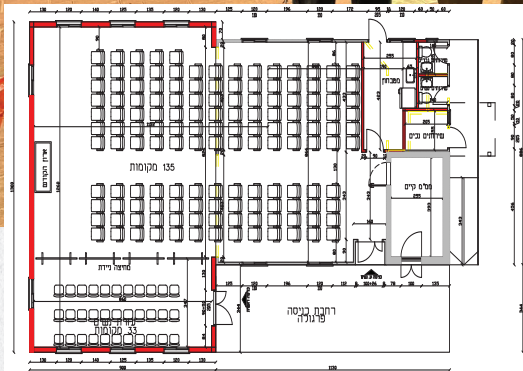
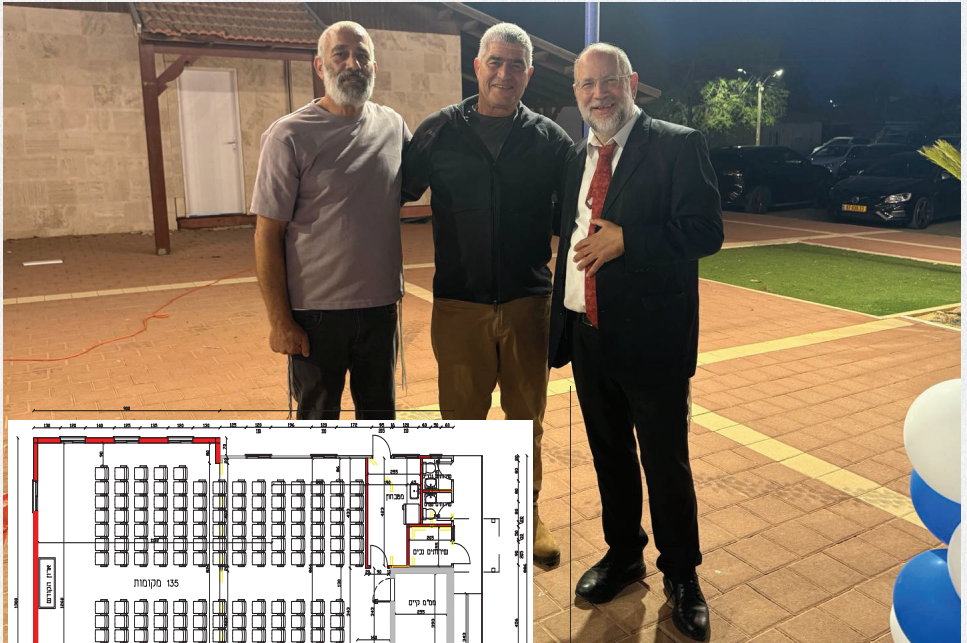




Construction of the first synagogue
